STATE OF FLORIDA HIGHLIGHTS

THE LEVY LEGISLATIVE UPDATE

Medicaid Reform

HB 7107 and HB 7109 by the Health and Human Services Committee and Chairman Schenck

After numerous public hearings throughout the state and more than a year of work, the House and Senate passed Medicaid Reform legislation, which in the simplest terms, requires Medicaid recipients to enroll in managed care plans. The term managed care is not limited to traditional Health Maintenance Organizations, but also includes Provider Service Networks and Accountable Care Organizations. We worked closely with hospital interests to ensure that hospitals have an opportunity to participate via Provider Service Networks and Accountable Care Organizations, and to ensure that the plans are required to be responsive to hospitals.

Another aspect of the Medicaid Reform debate this session was tort reform. The Senate's original Medicaid Reform proposal included several tort reform provisions, such as sovereign immunity for the University of Miami Medical School and Shands Healthcare along with limited liability for nursing homes and developmentally disabled service providers. Early House versions included only limited tort reform. Ultimately, the Legislature agreed to tort reform for Medicaid service providers, including physicians and hospitals. Specifically, HB 7109 limits non-economic damages that a Medicaid recipient can recover against hospital and physician providers to a maximum of \$300,000, regardless of the number of provider defendants. The maximum that can be recovered against

any single hospital or physician is \$200,000 per claimant in non-economic damages. The bill does allow the court to pierce these caps in circumstances where the provider has acted in bad faith or with willful disregard of human rights.

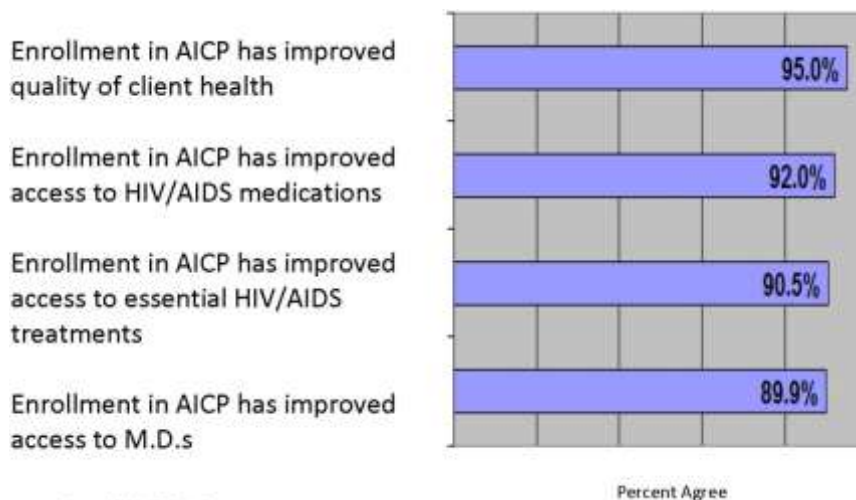
AIDS INSURANCE CONTINUATION PROGRAM (AICP)



The AIDS Insurance Continuation Program (AICP) preserves the private health insurance of low-income Floridians living with HIV/AIDS who cannot afford to pay their private health insurance premiums. The program is funded by the State of Florida Department of Health through the Ryan White Program (51%) and State of Florida General Revenue (49%).

2010 AICP Client Survey

The AICP distributes a survey to all actively enrolled clients every year. The information obtained from the survey provides a mechanism for gaining insight into the perceived value of the AICP and the quality of care received through the program. The survey incorporates a series of key quality-outcomes which include client perceptions concerning (a) personal quality of health; (b) intensity of health care services and utilization; and (c) quality of access to specialized HIV/AIDS care. In 2010, the client satisfaction rating on AICP Overall Quality was 95%.



The Spring AICP Statewide Technical Advisory Committee (ASTAC) meeting was held on April 14th in Fort Lauderdale, Florida. Topics of discussion at the meeting included the HIV/AIDS Division Strategic Plan for 2011-2013 and Health Care Reform.

Enhanced Comprehensive HIV Prevention Planning (ECHPP) Grant

The Florida Department of Health Bureau of HIV/AIDS Miami-Dade County was selected as a grantee of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) one year demonstration project, the Enhanced Comprehensive HIV Prevention Planning Grant for Metropolitan Statistical Areas most affected by HIV/AIDS. The ECHPP aims to maximize the impact of HIV prevention, care and treatment in 12 cities that have the highest AIDS prevalence in the United States. The project directly supports the National HIV/AIDS Strategy (NHAS).

The Health Council of South Florida Inc. (HCSF) is charged with the responsibility of writing and developing the ECHPP for Miami-Dade County as well as providing ongoing technical assistance to the ECHPP partners. On April 26th Miami-Dade was selected as one of the first jurisdictions to provide an overview of the ECHPP to the "12 Cities Steering Committee" of the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) 12 Cities Project. The 12 Cities Project serves as a proving ground to demonstrate how the broad range of Federally-supported HIV prevention, care, and treatment activities can work together more effectively across organizational and program boundaries. This effort will result in better identification of and response to service gaps, unmet needs, and scaled-up activities that will have a greater "payoff" in terms of achieving the goals of the NHAS. Enhanced integration of local service delivery will also be addressed and - where appropriate - resources realigned from lower priority to higher priority activities. Robert Sandrock from the HCSF was the lead presenter for the call among the key federal agencies of the 12 Cities Project.

The Florida Association of Free Clinics (FAFC) is working diligently to identify new resources and opportunities for free clinics. Currently, FAFC is partnered with Steede Medical, Invacare Supply Group, and Physician Sales & Services to provide medical equipment and supplies

to FAFc members at a significant discount. In addition, FAFc has been working with numerous programs that provide donated supplies to free clinics such as Gwynn Foundation, Direct Relief USA and AmeriCares. Thanks to FAFc's partnership with AmeriCares, we have secured donated supplies representing a **total cost savings of \$108,195.75** for FAFc member clinics this year.

Since its launch in April 2011, there have been 1,172 page views and 221 unique visitors to the website. In the future, FAFc will implement a password protected section of the website exclusively for FAFc members. Furthermore, FAFc is working closely with Transformations at the Edge (TATE) to introduce the 2012 Open Health Tools Academic Challenge, which will focus on "Health IT Transformations in Free Clinics". This project is a charter project for TATE that is supported through volunteer efforts and in many ways emulates the work of volunteers in free clinics today - a community-based partnership of industry, healthcare volunteers, academia, and social entrepreneurs. The project will create reusable models of community engagement that can be transposed and scaled across the country.

The HCI continues to set the bar in indicator dashboards, ease of use, appeal, design, applicability, platform neutrality, and integration of health data.

In the coming months we will again team-up with HCI to provide area hospitals Community Health Needs Assessments (CHNAs). With over ten years of experience in compiling District Health Profiles, the Health Council of South Florida is the ideal partner for hospitals in conducting CHNAs.

The Community Health Needs Assessment portal on Miami Matters will provide a constantly updated "living" needs assessment to help hospitals meet Healthcare Reform and IRS 990 reporting requirements. Fully embeddable within a hospital or health system's existing website, the CHNA System provides a dashboard of indicators that drive community health needs assessments, and contains a large database of promising practices to inform evidenced-based community benefit programs.

CONSORTIUM FOR A HEALTHIER MIAMI-DADE (CHMD)



The Health Council of South Florida (HCSF) continues to work with the Miami-Dade County Health Department and the Consortium for a Healthier Miami-Dade as evaluator for the Communities Putting Prevention to Work (CPPW) grant. HCSF staff attended the newly formed Farmer's Market and Community Gardens Workgroup and delivered a presentation outlining the scope of the evaluation under the grant. The HCSF produced the first quarterly evaluation report on the grant which highlights key findings in the grant to date. The Miami Matters CPPW Community Page went live in April of 2011 and progress towards the goals of the grant can now be tracked through this portal at www.miamidadematters.org/CPPW. The Health Council is currently working on the design of the daycare center and Farmer's Markets evaluation tools to be rolled out during the summer and fall.

planning, response, and recovery process which can be implemented during a pandemic event.

OPA-LOCKA CHILDHOOD OBESITY PREVENTION PROJECT

Hip-hop dancing, community gardening and healthy cooking are activities that Opa-Locka, Fla. children and families will have access to starting this summer as a way to prevent childhood obesity. These and other health initiatives received a total of \$64,500 in grants April 26th from War on Poverty-Florida (WPF) as part of the Building a Healthy Community Opa-Locka Childhood Obesity Prevention Project and community Call to Action issued in October 2010. The grants were announced at a special meeting of the community coalition at Opa-Locka City Hall.

Combined with an additional \$97,700 sustaining grant to WPF from Blue Cross and Blue Shield of Florida Foundation (BCBSF Foundation), the community initiative to reduce or prevent childhood obesity received more than \$160,000 to implement its Call to Action.

Seven community organizations received grants for programs that address one or more of the four Call to Action focus areas: early learning, schools and after-school programs, community and faith-based organizations and built environment.

The Health Council of South Florida received funding for its Miami Matters: Collaborating and Calculating to Prevent Childhood Obesity in Opa-Locka program, creating a customized database to track and identify trends in health and quality of life in Opa-Locka. Other organizations to receive grant funding include; The Portrait of Empowerment; Opa-Locka North Dade Front Porch Council, Inc.; Family Christian Association of America, Inc.; The Miami Foundation with Youth L.E.A.D.; Urban Green Works; and Carrie Meed Foundation.
