## INTRODUCTION

The Health Council of South Florida (HCSF) District 11 Health Profile shows key social determinants of health indicators that reflect or contribute to health and wellness in Miami-Dade and Monroe counties. Miami-Dade and Monroe county's health indicators are comparable to other counties, state and national data, when available. However, disparities in various health conditions among population or people groups based on race, ethnicity, sex, age, education and income must be considered when observing data.

Indicators are grouped into thirteen (13) general sections with an attempt to capture the top ten (10) leading causes of death and high-cost Emergency Department visits for District 11.




